

Question, Persuade, Refer Suicide Prevention | Hendrix Olson (they/ them) & Shane Baron-Deutsch (they/them) | Educator Focus

- For Ages 18+
- QPR (Question, Persuade, and Refer) Gatekeeper Training for Suicide Prevention is an educational
 program designed to teach people the warning signs of a suicide crisis and how to respond. Gatekeepers
 can include anyone who is strategically positioned to recognize and refer someone at risk of suicide (e.g.,
 parents, friends, neighbors, teachers, coaches, caseworkers). The process follows three steps: (1)
 Question the individual's desire or intent regarding suicide, (2) Persuade the person to seek and accept
 help, and (3) Refer the person to appropriate resources.

Carey Rose O'Connell (she/her) Gaining over 20 years of corporate management and communications experience, in 2017, Carey Rose left the box and created her New Mexico-based business, RoseBrand Consultation Services. She partners with content creators, non-profits, small businesses, independent brand owners, and entrepreneurs. In 2022 her passion for supporting the foundations of a sustainable film and media industry inspired her to focus a critical portion of her consultation work on independent, local content creators. Mr. Carbajal's work focuses on the LGBTQIA+, Chicanx, and LGBTQIA+ Chicanx communities and aims at centering lost voices with a focus on equity and social justice. They are also on the advisory council for the national GSA Network's Two-Spirit Initiative, working with other Indigenous LGBTQIA2s+ folks to create resources and opportunities for Native QT2s+ youth.

Jesse Freidin (he/him) is an award-winning queer/trans photographer + author. For 15 years he was America's leading fine art dog photographer, and now focuses his attention on elevating the experience of trans community through portraiture + interviews. His current series "Are You OK?" addresses the dangers of the current wave of anti-trans legislation in a passionate attempt to erase stigma + uncover voices of those most affected. Jesse's work is in over 150 private collections. He's featured in NYT, Insider, Huff Post, NPR + more. He is the author of two books: Finding Shelter: Portraits of Love, Healing + Survival + When Dogs Heal: Powerful Stories of People Living with HIV + Dogs That Saved Them.

Jessica Pollard (she/her) joined the Responsible Sex Education Institute of Planned Parenthood of the Rocky Mountains in October, 2022. She teaches in classrooms about concepts like gender & sexuality and risk reduction in her role as an Education Program Specialist.
